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Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety Division

1. Introduction:

- The **Poverty Alleviation Coordination Council (PACC)** created in February 2019 was tasked with the preparation of a poverty alleviation strategy for the government of Pakistan.
- Followed by this, the Government of Pakistan's Social Safety Strategy was launched on March 27, 2019, as Pakistan's largest ever poverty eradication initiative.
- Subsequently, the Cabinet approved the creation of the "Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety Division" in April 2019.

2. Functions as per Rules of Business, 1973:

- Policies regarding social protection with the objective to provide basic necessities of life, such as food, clothing, housing, education and medical relief, for all such citizens, as are permanently or temporarily unable to earn their livelihood on account of infirmity, sickness or unemployment.
- Policies and strategies regarding poverty alleviation with the objective of improving the quality of life of the poorest segments of society; monitoring implementation of such policies and strategies.
- 3. Policies for mainstreaming the poverty alleviation and social protection concerns in the public sector expenditure.
- 4. Establishment of various innovation challenges to design initiatives for poverty alleviation.
- 5. Coordination with all relevant stakeholders including but not limited to concerned divisions and provincial governments for integration and synergizing of efforts and ensuring that all policies are made with a pro-poor focus.
- 6. Working with non-government sector to design and implement pro-poor initiatives.
- 7. Establishment of a time bound and output-based Labour Advisory Council and implementation of the proposals thereof.

- 8. Collection of Zakat and Usher, disbursement of Zakat and Usher to the Provinces and other areas as per formula approved by Council of Common Interests.
- 9. Coordination with relevant ministries and provincial governments for poverty alleviation and social protection initiatives.

10. Administration of:

- (i) Benazir Income Support Programme.
- (ii) Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal.

11. Administrative matters of:

- (i) Trust for Voluntary Organizations.
- (ii) Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund.
- (iii) Centre for Social Entrepreneurship.
- (iv) Centre for Rural Economy.

12. **Poverty Alleviation Coordination Council.**

1. PMDU & PROGRAMMER OFFICE

The detail of official business dealt by Prime Minister's Delivery Unit & Programmer Office is as under:

• PMDU

This section is tasked with handling PMDU and PCP matters of PA&SS Division and ancillary Organizations etc. A total of 917 cases containing citizens grievances were received and disposed off during the financial year 2020-2021.

PROGRAMMING

The Programmer deals with the development of software for reconciliation of Central Zakat Fund, matters related to IT etc.

2. <u>INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION</u>

Main functions of this section include:

- Coordinating with international departments/organizations.
- Signing and negotiating MoUs with other countries and international agencies in coordination with MOFA and EAD.
- Facilitating the projection of Pakistan's poverty alleviation initiatives at the global level though international engagements such as conferences and forums such as SCO, UN, OIC, etc.
- This Division has taken the following steps during FY 2020-2021 to enhance international collaboration focusing on poverty alleviation:
 - i. MoU with Ministry of Commerce, People's Republic of China titled "Cooperation for Poverty Alleviation in the field of Commerce".
 - ii. Hosted the first meeting of the Joint Working Group on Poverty Alleviation of Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) Member States, in pursuance of decisions taken at the Moscow Summit of the SCO Head of States.
 - iii. In the process of initiating a Pilot Project on Poverty Graduation through the development of village-level social enterprises in selected districts across the country in collaboration with International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD).

3. COUNCIL & COORDINATION SECTION

The detail of official business dealt by Council and Coordination Section is as under:

• Parliamentary Business:

Preparation of Answers of Parliamentary Questions, Motions, Resolutions, point of Orders etc. of the National Assembly, Senate and submission to the quarters concerned. Coordinating for briefing to the Minister/ Advisor alongside preparation of briefs.

Preparation of Working Papers for meetings of the Standing committees of the National Assembly and the Senate, Coordination in conduct of meetings.

During the F.Y 2020-21, 780 cases were received and disposed by this section.

Coordination for implementation of Cabinet and Cabinet Committee decisions and submission of reports.

• Litigation:

6. PLANNING SECTION

- The planning section is tasked with looking after the matters of the Division's Public Section Development Programmes (PSDP) funded projects. Currently, the Division runs two PSDP projects:
 - i. Tahafuz Program
 - ii. Social Protection Delivery Unit

SEHAT TAHAFUZ PROGRAM

- The Sehat Tahafuz program aims to create a one-window social safety net to protect the
 vulnerable population of Pakistan from catastrophic health expenditures, and thereby aid
 the poverty-stricken, who are struggling with health financial shocks.
- The program works through partnerships with public sector hospitals in three main phases.
 It covers "out of pocket expenditure" associated with pre-approved 900 treatments packages across 21 departments.
- The program concluded its successful pilot phase in June 2021; where it served 274 patients through 2 partner hospitals in Islamabad and Rawalpindi. Given the success of the pilot project, Sehat Tahafuz will be expanded into a full-fledged program for the FY-2021-24.
- In the future, Sehat Tahafuz plans to empanel 14 Public Sector Hospitals in Federal, Punjab, KPK, Baluchistan, Sindh, Gilgit Baltistan and Azad Kashmir. Details of hospitals to be empaneled:

SOCIAL PROTECTION DELIVERY UNIT

- The Social Protection Delivery Unit was established to lead the delivery of the country's Social Protection Programme and track cadence of delivery across several components.
- The distinctive role and objective of SPDU is to oversee implementation, coordinate, strategize and assess progress of the Ministry's social protection initiatives.
- SPDU is also tracking implementation of the goals and targets established under "Performance Agreement" signed with the Prime Minister.
- SPDU operates through four wings:
 - i. Monitoring and Evaluation
 - ii. Strategic Rollout
 - iii. Advisory Support
 - iv. Communication and Stakeholder Engagement

1) Monitoring and Evaluation Wing:

M&E of SPDU is an integral unit that devises mechanisms for initiatives tracking including establishing routines and processes and coordinating with other ancillary organizations to strategize and develop mechanisms to ensure successful delivery of different social safety programs of the government. Specific functions include:

- Follow-ups on Federal and Provincial Initiatives.
- Managing and updating PMDU portal for Strategy Initiatives.
- Organizing monthly review and planning sessions, consultations with the stakeholders for completion of initiatives.
- Conducting evidence building research and evaluation studies.
- Developing and finalizing Performance Agreement and conducting regular stocktaking to ensure its successful completion.
- Managing dashboards to track monitoring and ensures true visualizations and projection of progress on all social safety programmes under its purview.
- Reviewing governance observatory dashboard template.

- Identifying gaps in the Governance Mechanism and actions planned.
- Ensuring quality assurance and capacity development of ancillary organisations in compliance of Governance Observatory.

2) Strategic Roll-Out

Strategic support is set up for designing & detailing initiatives within the priority initiatives that are directly within the ambit of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety Division, with support on prioritization of key areas and designing pilots and implementation plans. Important tasks carried out include:

 Developed mechanism for implementation of Private Sector Engagement Policy together with the vision of Corporate Social Responsibility and engaged and facilitated non-government stakeholders to leverage their technical, financial, entrepreneurship and outreach support to amplify impact of the program.

3) Advisory Support

Advisory support aims at providing policy level and technical input and framing trade-offs/considerations around key topics relevant to the program. Important functions performed include:

- Conducted comprehensive consultative sessions to develop and finalize the policy for the Private Sector Engagement.
- Conducted intellectual work to form Core group of Informal Economy Workers
 Unit at the Division through extensive external and internal consultations and
 prepared a report.
- Drafted the Abstract of Tenancy Farming and initiated data mining from provinces.
 Supported in forming a Labour Expert Group to study application of labour laws to tenant farmers and to make recommendations for formalizing tenancy farming system

4) Communication and Stakeholder Engagement

Communications and Stakeholder Engagement aims at planning, leading, executing, and overseeing all communications and stakeholder engagement activities including areas related to PR and strategic communications for the ministry. Important functions performed are:

Implementation of multiple tools of communication such as media engagement,
 SMS campaigns, video documentaries, web and social media campaigns to create awareness among masses regarding different social protection initiatives.

- Development of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) and launching of audio version of FAQs of different initiatives.
- Surveillance of electronic media on daily basis and sharing ministry related talk show analysis reports. Ensuring script writing and production of e-newsletter.

• Creation and dissemination of Public Service Announcement.

7. BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME

- Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) was launched in 2008 as a flagship social safety net Programme at the national level by the Federal Government of Pakistan with the vision to:
 - Enhance the quality of life and socio-economic status of the most vulnerable and marginalized segments of society.
 - Make them productive citizens with dignity and respect, with a view to eradicating poverty in the country.
 - Reduce poverty and promote equitable distribution of wealth especially for the lowincome groups.
- Wings of BISP implementing core initiatives are given below:

1. Unconditional Cash Transfer Wing:

Benazir Kafaalat Programme:

- The Unconditional Cash Transfers (UCT) also called "Kafaalat" is aimed at cushioning the negative effects food crisis and inflation on the poor, particularly women, through provision of Unconditional Cash Transfers to eligible families.
- The quarterly cash grant has been gradually enhanced by the Government from Rs. 3,000/- per family to Rs. 3,600/- in FY 2013-14 to Rs. 6,000/- in FY 2019-20.
- Currently, the number of Kafaalat beneficiaries stands at around 6.5 million which is to be increased to 8 million by June, 2022.

BISP Emergency Cash Programme Round-1:

- The first phase of BISP Emergency Cash Programme was launched in April, 2020 to help poor families affected by Covid-19.
- An amount of approximately Rs. 180 billion was disbursed to around 14.9 million (including Kafaalat beneficiaries) beneficiaries @ Rs. 12,000/- per beneficiary.

BISP Emergency Cash Programme Round-2:

- Keeping in view the increase in economic hardships due to the 3rd wave of Covid-19, second phase of BISP Emergency Cash Programme was launched on June 16th, 2021.
- Around 48 billion has been disbursed to around 4 million (other than Kafaalat beneficiaries) additional beneficiaries @ Rs. 12,000/- per beneficiary.

Compensation Package for LOC Affectees in AJ&K Region:

- Families living along the Line of Control (LOC) are being provided cash assistance by BISP under Special Relief Package launched in June, 2020.
- Under the cited programme, additional beneficiaries (other than Kafaalat beneficiaries) are being provided emergency cash assistance @ Rs. 24,000/- in two installments of Rs. 12,000/- each. Around 36,000 beneficiaries are identified under the programme.

Financial Inclusion and Financial Literacy Programmes:

In pursuance of BISP's Financial Inclusion Strategy, it has designed and launched a
pilot project for opening of Savings Accounts (Mobile Wallets) and provision of
Financial Literacy to Kafaalat beneficiaries.

2. Conditional Cash Transfer Wing:

Benazir Taleemi Wazaif Program:

- Recognizing that many children in BISP beneficiary households and families are not currently attending school, the GoP launched a Co-Responsibility Cash Transfer for BISP beneficiary families in October 2012 for Primary Education. Currently, stipends of Rs. 2000 to girls and Rs. 1500 to boys are being given on quarterly basis.
- A one-time graduation bonus of Rs. 3000 is part of the Taleemi Wazaif programme to encourage girls to complete primary education.
- The Taleemi Wazaif Programme is set to expand to include students from Secondary and Higher Secondary schools from July 2021. The proposed stipend rate of students will be:

 Rs.3.665 Billion has been disbursed under Taleemi Wazaif Programme to 1.24 million children in the Financial Year 2020-21.

Benazir Nashonuma Program:

- To address the problem of malnutrition and stunting among children, BISP has
 designed a Conditional Cash Transfer intervention to increase the uptake of Health and
 Nutrition services of its beneficiaries.
- The program aims to address stunting among pregnant and lactating women (PLW) and their children less than 2 years of age through the provision of additional cash of PKR 1500 per quarter per PLW and boy child and PKR 2,000/- per quarter per girl child of BISP beneficiary families.
- In return, mothers must commit to attending regular antenatal health checks and awareness sessions during pregnancy, consuming specialized nutritious food (SNF), and taking their children for immunization and regular health checks.
- Under the program, 81,028 beneficiaries have been enrolled and Rs.236.02 Million has been disbursed so far.
- The program is being implemented in 14 districts of the country. Province wise allocation of districts is as under:

3. Complimentary Initiatives Wing

Benazir Undergraduate Scholarship Project:

 BISP Undergraduate Scholarships Project, a joint project of the Higher Education Commission (HEC) and BISP, seeks to increase access to higher education for talented undergraduate students from low-income families.

- This project provides merit and needs-based scholarships, including tuition fees plus a
 stipend to cover living expenses, to qualified undergraduate students from low-income
 families to study in public sector Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) of all regions of
 Pakistan, including Azad Jammu & Kashmir and Gilgit-Baltistan.
- 50% scholarships are reserved for the females whereas 2% scholarships are reserved for differently-abled students.
- Currently, 41,000 students have received the scholarship as part of Batch-II of FY 2020-21.
- Total Budget Released for FY 2020-21: Rs8.468 billion

5. NSER Wing:

- National Socio Economic Registry (NSER) is an asset based census conducted in 2011 for the first time to assess the socio economic status of the Households (HHs).
- The NSER was updated upon finalization of the instrument i.e. the Poverty Score Card (PSC) in 2019.
- To optimize the coverage and to rectify any discrepancies resulting from human error during survey process, NSER established 506 BISP Registration Centers across country.

6. Human Resource Management (HRM)/ Admn Wing:

- Key tasks of the HR wing include:
 - Recruitment process of 882 posts of Compliance Monitors was completed to strengthen the Conditional Cash Transfer wing.
 - Sixty Six (66) officers joined BISP on deputation basis, which improved the overall working and operations of BISP.
 - Hiring of HR Consultancy Firm to carry out a detailed study for rationalization of BISP structure was completed. The firm has already submitted most of its deliverables.
 - Creation of positions for Cyber Security Wing and selection process of its Human Resource i,e. 07 positions was completed.
 - To deal with the discipline matters of BISP Employees, Civil Servants (Efficiency & Discipline), 2020 were adopted from the BISP Board.
 - Continuing with the zero tolerance policy on indiscipline, misconduct & corruption, 36 cases of disciplinary proceedings were concluded/ finalized after fulfillment of all codal formalities as enshrined in the relevant rules, including conduct of formal inquiries.

7. BISP One Window Centre, Islamabad:

- BISP has introduced several programs targeting disadvantaged groups and now established a one window Centre/service in Islamabad.
- This One Window Centre aims to interconnect, strengthen, and coordinate social safety
 nets for the vulnerable segments of the society in a transparent manner to minimize the
 potential impacts of unanticipated shocks and duplication resulting from the working
 in isolation.

8. Internal Audit wing

 BISP internal audit wing prepares risk-based audit plan, undertakes audit execution, reporting and follow up.

10. Media, Communication & Outreach (MC&O) wing

- Eleven (11) Khuli Kachehris have been conducted by BISP where problems and payment related issues of BISP beneficiaries were addressed on telephone
- Daily monitoring of national newspapers, social media for BISP related news.
- TVCs have been prepared and broadcast on mainstream electronic media channels which are meant for the awareness of all stakeholders.

11. Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) wing

 M&E Wing assesses relevance, efficiency, effectiveness of various ongoing and upcoming activities of BISP through process monitoring, evaluation studies and other need-based desk and field monitoring surveys conducted from time to time.

12. International Cooperation and Coordination Wing

- To help Government of Pakistan boost its emergency relief measures, International Development Association (World Bank) negotiated US\$ 200 million concessional lending facility namely "Pandemic Response effectiveness for Pakistan" in 2020. In this respect, BISP has disbursed US\$25 million against as emergency cash transfers to up to 4 million beneficiaries enrolled in programme across the country.
- Crisis Resilient Social Protection Programme (CRISP)- World Bank, amounting to \$600 Million has been signed with the Government of Pakistan in March 2021. The programme development objective is to support a more adaptive social protection system that will contribute to any future crisis-resilience among poor and vulnerable households.
- BISP and Department for International Development (DFID) signed Pakistan National Cash Transfer Programme (PNCTP) amounting to GBP £ 300 million in 2012. The grant spans over a period of eight years (2012-2020).
- In order to provide much-needed fiscal space to the government of Pakistan to boost its endeavors to fight the pandemic, ADB has extended a concessional loan facility amounting to US\$ 200 million under the 'Emergency Assistance for Fighting against COVID 19 Pandemic. The loan agreement was signed on 5th May, 2020.

13. Procurement Wing

• To administer and execute, all types of procurements, there is a dedicated Procurement Wing in BISP. Major Procurement executed during FY 2020-21:

- i. Hiring of Human Resource Consulting Firm (HRCF): BISP hired a Consulting Firm through open competitive bidding procedure (QCBS) to review the current BISP's Human Resource policies and procedures.
- ii. Hiring of Firm for ISO 27001 Certification.
- iii. Through an open competitive bidding procedure, BISP contracted Pakistan Post Office Foundation for printing of receipts with QR codes for easy scanning and with unique identification of each receipt.
- iv. Procurement of OEM Extended Warranty for HP & Dell Server, Software and Storage Equipment.
- v. BISP procured motorcycles for "Compliance Monitors" working under Conditional Cash Transfer Programme.

8. PAKISTAN POVERTY ALLEVIATION FUND

- Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund (PPAF) is the lead apex institution for communitydriven development in the country.
- Since its inception, PPAF has signed agreements with multilateral/bilateral agencies, through Government of Pakistan, involving funding equivalent to USD 1.425 billion with different donors.

Key outputs of PPAF are:


- Since its inception in April 2000 till June 2021, PPAF has disbursed an amount of approximately PKR 233 billion to its Partner Organizations (POs) in 147 districts across the country.
- The National Poverty Graduation Initiative (NPGI) was launched by the Government of Pakistan in 2019; PPAF was designated its lead agency. Under NPGI, the following two major programmes are being implemented by PPAF:

Amdan/National Poverty Graduation Programme (NPGP):

- The programme is a Government of Pakistan and IFAD funded USD 150 million (Government of Pakistan USD 50 million and IFAD USD 100 Million) initiative.
- The overarching goal of the programme is to assist the ultra-poor and very poor in graduating out of poverty on sustainable basis while improving their overall food security, nutritional status, and resilience to climate change.
- The programme aims at providing livelihood assets and trainings to 176,947 ultra and vulnerable poor households.

Key outputs are:

During the reporting period, July 2020 to June 2021, a total of 36,012 productive assets
have been transferred to the ultra-poor and vulnerable poor households identified as
per set criteria.



- Of this, over 92% assets have been transferred to women beneficiaries.
- Since inception of the programme in July 2019 till June 2021, overall 61,066 (92% assets to women) livelihood productive assets have been transferred to the ultra-poor and vulnerable poor households identified as per set criteria.

Interest Free Loan (IFL) Programme:

• IFL is one of the major components of the NPGI being implemented by PPAF through its 24 Partner Organizations. The range of IFLs is Rs. 20,000 to Rs. 75,000.

Key outputs are:

- Under this programme, during the reporting period July 2020 to June 2021, a total of 635,125 loans (47% loans to women) amounting to Rs. 23,539.68 million have been disbursed to borrowers.
- Cumulatively, since the start of the programme in July 2019 to June 2021, a total of 1,416,059 loans (46% loans to women) have been disbursed, amounting to Rs. 50,460.01 million.

- During the same period, a total of 6,848 community institutions were formed and 7,576 community and PO staff were trained (including 39% women) under the Institutional Development and Social Mobilization component.
- Under the Livelihood Enhancement and Protection (LEP) component, 4,249 individuals (36% women) received skills and entrepreneurial trainings and 35,583 productive assets (87% to women) were transferred to ultra and vulnerable poor households.
- Under the Health, Education and Nutrition component, 75 educational facilities were supported during the reporting period, 28,316 students (57% girls) were enrolled, and 142,920 consultation visits by patients (58% women and girls) conducted. A total of 635,125 loans (46% loans to women) were disbursed through the IFL scheme.
- Overall, these projects and interventions benefitted around 1,102,078 poor and marginalized people, including 49.8% women beneficiaries, during the reporting period. The highlights of physical progress are given as follows:

- Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal (PBM), established through an Act of Parliament in the year 1992, stands among the prominent Social Safety Nets of the country with its eminent humanitarian services via district-level network.
- PBM has its Head Office in Islamabad and Provincial / Regional Offices in Karachi, Quetta, Lahore, Peshawar, Islamabad, Multan and Gigit Baltistan. There are 154 District Offices all over the Pakistan including Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJ&K) and Gilgit Baltistan.
- Bait-ul-Mal Board is the supreme policy making body of PBM.
 Following are some of its current programs:

• Individual Financial Assistance:

- Financial aid is provided to deserving individual belonging to three categories: medical, education, general.

• Roti Sab Kay Live Initiative:

- PBM has launched "Roti Sab kay Liye" project for provision of two-time hygienic packed food (Lunch & Dinner) to needy individuals through Mobile Unit in urban and rural areas of Rawalpindi / Islamabad, Lahore, Faisalabad, Peshawar, Multan and Gujranwala on different routes.
- One thousand beneficiaries are provided with packed meal through each vehicle.
 Presently, 12 such vehicles are operational.

• PBM Orphanages:

- At Present, 51 PBM Orphanages are functional throughout the country.
- Each centre accommodates 100 orphans aging 4-6 years.
- Out of 51 Centres, 9 are in Punjab, 5 in South Punjab, 11 in Sindh, 8 in KPK, 4 in Balochistan, 11 in ICT/AJK and 3 in GB.
- At present, 4486 children are enrolled in these 51 Orphanages.

• Women Empowerment Centres (WECs)

- Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal has established Women Empowerment Centres (WEC) throughout the country at district since 1995.
- These centers are providing free vocational training to widows, orphan & poor girls in modern professional skills.
- 122 WECs have recently been modernized with IT Labs (having 20 Computer in each), throughout the country. Capacity building workshop pertaining to latest programming skills, networking, office automation etc. have also been carried out in collaboration with Microsoft Office Pakistan. Trainees of these centers are also being paid stipend of Rs. 50/day on attendance basis.

• Schools for Rehabilitation of Child Labour (PBM SRCLs):

- 159 schools for the rehabilitation of Child Labour are functional all over the country.
- The children involved in child labor are enrolled in these schools and receive free education up to primary level.
- Out of 159 SRCL, 46 are in Punjab, 20 are in South Punjab, 37 are in Sindh, 24 are in KPK, 14 are in Baluchistan, 13 are in ICT/AJK and 5 are in G.B. About 17,893 children are enrolled in these schools.

• Serving the Persons With Disabilities (PWDs):

• Under this program, PBM provides wheelchairs, white canes, artificial limbs, hearing aids to PWDs.

• Civil Society/NGOs:

- The main objective of the Civil Society Wing (CSW) is to provide rehabilitative services to the poor segment of the society through grant-in-aid to the NGOs.
